President's Remarks at the NSYE on Thursday

Below are answers to most or your questions. We are still trying to get a complete list of former Presidents who have visited the NYSE. I am also trying to track down more detailed information about the increase in public participation in the stock markets since President Clinton assumed office.

Visits by Former Presidents

Former President Taft, 1917, speaking on the trading floor at a Liberty Loan Rally (WWI bonds)

President Reagan, March 28, 1985, to date, first and only sitting President to visit the NYSE; he visited again, after he left office, with President Gorbachev May 13, 1992.)

Presidential Visits to the New York Stock Exchange

As a follow-up to my previous memorandum, the complete list of presidential visits to the New York Stock Exchange is as follows:

William Howard Taft: October 18, 1917 after he left office

Harry S. Truman: June 7, 1961 after he left office

Richard M. Nixon: June 28, 1961 before he assumed office

Ronald Reagan:

August 21, 1979 before he assumed office March 19, 1980 before he assumed office March 28, 1985 while he was in office

May 13, 1992 accompanied by Mikhail Gorbachev

after he left office

Also, you had inquired about the history of the Bell Podium, and the names of other "notables" who have stood there. Ringing the bell to open the trading session dates from 1871. Prior to 1871, the NYSE's President's gavel opened the trading session. The Bell Podium dates from 1903 when the NYSE moved into its current headquarters at 11 Wall Street. The ringing of the opening and closing bell has become somewhat of a media "event" with daily televised coverage by both CNNfn and CNBC.

Stock Market Facts

1. 1998 - for first time in 30 years, our value of stock ownership exceeds the value of real estate ownership.

2. 1999 - household ownership of stocks hit <u>25%</u> of total assets, previous record was <u>24%</u> in 1968. In 1987 (post market correction) the figure was <u>10%</u>.
