My dear Senator Russell:

In response to your communication of November 30, 1936, I advised you that I would be glad to have our Regional Administrator in Atlanta make some investigation into the cause of Mr. J. N. Hanna's difficulties in retaining employment with two Atlanta brokerage houses and when he had reported I would advise you.

Our Atlanta Regional Administrator reports that Mr. Hanna's employment with the two firms in Atlanta was entirely satisfactory, but that in each instance the employment was only temporary. I am further advised that Mr. Hanna did not lose his jobs because of his union activities, since his employers stated that they were very well satisfied with his services and they considered him a capable telegrapher; so far as they knew, he had not been "blacklisted" by the New York Stock Exchange.

We also ascertained that Mr. Hanna is now employed in the Chattanooga office of E. A. Pierce & Company. In case Mr. Hanna should encounter further difficulties in retaining this position, the National Labor Relations Board may be helpful to you in this matter.

As requested by you, I am returning Mr. Hanna's letter herewith.
