Dear Mr. Sporkin:

I am a lawyer, retired now for about 10 years. I have no business connections, but I read quite a bit, including the Wall Street Journal.

Every day I read a new story about some corporation that has confessed its alleged sins of making foreign pay-offs, such confessions being directed to the SEC. Since this has struck me as rather ridiculous, I have inquired around as to who is responsible for all this and it seems to be you.

Accordingly, when I read the enclosed article by Dr. Jacoby of UCLA on page 4 of the Town Hall Reporter, I immediately thought of you.

According to Dr. Jacoby's sensible analysis, most of the alleged sins are sins of Government and other people in the foreign countries and not of American business men. It has struck me as a very foolish thing for someone in Washington to drive everyone trying to do business in foreign countries to the benefit of our balance of trade, nuts.
